Legal Report

Unfortunately, in the current climate of relations between the public and the police, the media has reported on what feels like more and more assaults and attacks on police officers. Although the job has always been dangerous, police officers everywhere need to be more focused on their own safety than ever before. Thankfully, the law provides for various types of disability benefits because of the dangerous nature of the job. This month's Legal Report focuses on the matter of police officers being assaulted in the line of duty and how the Retirement System determines whether or not the "assault" is an "accident" in the context of a claim for accidental disability retirement benefits (3/4).

In the event that an officer is assaulted, there are several things that need to be taken into account and completed as soon after the event as possible. The severity of the injury takes complete precedence over any of the legal issues that may ultimately become a reality down the line. From the perspective of whether or not the Police Department will accept the injury as being covered under General Municipal Law section 207-c, for the most part the majority of cases do not provide a hurdle as it relates to an officer's ability to receive all the medical treatment, care and protection he or she is due from the Police Department. As with any other line of duty injury, a police officer who is the victim of an assault is also covered under General Municipal Law 207-c. Section 207-c provides that if a police officer is unable to work due to a line of duty injury, the officer will receive full wages tax-free. The legislative intent of this law is clearly designed to protect police officers who perform extremely dangerous work and suffer frequent injuries. Many of these injuries are the result of assaults and can be career ending.

From a legal perspective, the Police Department typically recognizes that an assault on a police officer occurred in the line of duty and injuries sustained are causally related to that assault. In such a case, the Police Department will grant full coverage under GML section 207-c, thus protecting and preserving the officer's rights while he or she is recuperating.

However, there are other benefits to which a police officer might be entitled, which can be far more problematic. If for no other reason, documentation of the facts and circumstances of an assault will be integral to any future cases. Within seven (7) days of the injury, a police officer must provide an injury report to the Police Department pursuant to the Department Manual. As we have written many times in the past, the accuracy of this initial report is crucial. While an initial report indicating that an "assault" occurred may be sufficient for the Police Department to establish line of duty status, thereby authorizing benefits to the officer pursuant to GML section 207-c, the term "assault" alone will not be enough to support a 3/4 or Accidental Disability Retirement claim. Therefore, our advice, as always, is to be as thorough and specific with the facts of the assault as possible. If the officer was kicked or punched or elbowed or hit with a crow bar

as part of the assault then the description of the assault must include these facts and also identify which body parts were injured. If the officer was "assaulted" in some other manner then these facts this must be included as well. The more thorough and accurate the report is, especially with what constituted the "assault", future issues with disability claims may be avoided.

Once the report is generated and provided to the Police Department, this report, which is the one most contemporaneous with the assault, will be the accident description found to be the most credible. At this point the police officer should be making sure that all the subsequent Workers' Compensation and any other paperwork is completed, is filed timely and is consistent with any prior report(s). By filing the accident report within the seven (7) day time period required by the Police Department, the police officer meets the 30 day notice requirement for Workers' Compensation claims. Also, the police officer should file for Workers' Compensation as soon as possible so that the extra layer of protection for medical care, afforded by the Workers' Compensation law, can be established as quickly as possible. There are some medical tests and procedures, which require authorization from the insurance carrier prior to being performed, such as laboratory tests costing more than \$1,000 and any surgeries not included in the Workers' Compensation guidelines. Since the process of requesting and obtaining authorization from the insurance carrier can take some time, it is advisable to take all necessary steps to avoid a delay in the carrier's response to the request for authorization. It is in the interests of the injured police officer and the Police Department that the officer recuperates and is back to work as soon as medically possible. Therefore, avoiding any delay in obtaining required authorizations for care and treatment is extremely important. Filing a timely Workers' Compensation claim is the best way to accomplish this.

In many cases it is not readily apparent, just after the accident, whether or not an injury is severe enough to be permanently disabling and career ending. For this reason it is critically important to keep in mind that paperwork completed following the injury be complete and accurate. Not only do you have to be thorough in describing how the injury occurred, you must also be sure to identify all injured parts of the body. While you are able to amend an accident report later on, it is far more preferable to list all injuries right from the beginning. Even if the injury does not appear to be significant, list it anyway because you simply cannot predict what that injury may develop into.

As with any "accidental" injury, if the police officer can no longer perform the full duties of a police officer then he or she is entitled to 3/4 of final average salary, a tax-free benefit, assuming all other requirements have been met. Unfortunately, the Retirement System does not simply accept the determination of either the Police Department or the Workers' Compensation Board as it relates to the term "assault". In fact, the Retirement System does not even accept the determination of a criminal court in deciding if the officer was "assaulted" and even if the perpetrator is arrested

for an “assault” is not binding on the Retirement System. The Retirement System has a very simple reason for this: they do not have an assault bill for police officers, but instead require that the “assault” must meet the requirement of being “accidental”. Therefore, the assault still must be “unexpected, out of the ordinary, and injurious in nature” and not be an inherent risk of the job. For these reasons, the facts surrounding the assault are key. Further, if an accident report merely says the officer was the victim of an “assault,” this does not meet the burden of proving the injury was as a result of something unexpected or out of the ordinary. Being assaulted while “effecting arrests, “restraining”, “gaining control”, “taking down”, “constraining”, “holding back”, or “holding down” a prep are all risks inherent in the job and, therefore are not recognized as “accidents” by the Retirement System. The Retirement System puts great emphasis on the initial description of the accident, so that any subsequent description often is ignored. Our goal is always to provide the best advice we possibly can in order to avoid any pitfalls that could derail a claim for accidental disability retirement benefits right from the start.

TOP COP AWARD - APRIL 2015

Officer Brian Alexander and Officer Eric Rivera

Officer Alexander and Officer Rivera were doubled in RMP 316 and received an assignment for an aided case with a notification from Lifeline medical alert stating an elderly woman was heard yelling "Help" "Get away from me" and "Hurry".

Upon arriving at the scene the Officers attempted to gain entry to the residence along the sides of the house unsuccessfully. The officers then approached the front door. They observed a male peer out from behind the blinds of the kitchen window. The Officer's banged on the door and identified themselves as the police and demanded they open the door. The inner door was opened by an elderly female. The male was standing approximately 4 feet behind the elderly female as she struggled to unlock the screen door. Officer Alexander instructed the male to open the screen door to which the elderly female yelled "stay away from me" to the male. The female was able to unlock the screen door and the Officers gained access to the premise at which time they separated the male and the elderly female. When the elderly female was being interviewed she stated "I can't believe he would do that. I've known him and his family since he was a kid. My husband is rolling in his grave." It was ascertained that the 28 year old male did sexually assault the female victim. The victim was transported to NUMC for medical attention and the subject was transported to Special Victim's Squad for arrest processing.

Police Officer Alexander and Rivera's quick actions resulted in the arrest of a dangerous predator. The defendant was charged with Rape 1st Degree.

TOP COP AWARD – MAY 2015

Sergeant Scott Harbison and Officer Mark Kellerman

On May 30, 2015 at approximately 1630 hours Sergeant Harbison was patrolling the New Hyde Park area looking for a named subject, who was wanted by the Third Squad for several burglaries in the New Hyde Park area. The subject had been known to be operating a Jeep Grand Cherokee.

At 1657 hours an audible alarm was dispatched at 526 Cherry Ln in New Hyde Park. At that time Sgt. Harbison notified CB that he was responding to the alarm. Sgt. Harbison determined that the location of the alarm was in the target time frame and area of previous burglaries, committed by the aforementioned subject. At 1703 hours Sgt. Harbison broadcasted a notification for the responding units as well as the West end units to be on the lookout for the suspect and vehicle, and provided the license plate information of the subject's vehicle.

At 1704 hours, Police Officer Kellerman, who was on an unrelated investigation, observed the subject vehicle parked on Jericho Turnpike. Officer Kellerman immediately made a U-turn to conduct an investigation when he

observed a male who he recognized from the Third Squad wanted Intel bulletins as a wanted subject. The subject, who was carrying a black bag, made eye contact with Officer Kellerman and quickly attempted to get into his vehicle, which was occupied by a female who was sitting in the passenger seat. Police Officer Kellerman quickly exited his vehicle and approached the subject and placed him into custody as he was attempting to get into the vehicle. Sergeant Harbison responded to assist Officer Kellerman and immediately removed the female from the vehicle and secured the vehicle as evidence.

A loaded .45 caliber Hi Point handgun was found inside the glove box of the subject's vehicle. The subject was also found to be in possession of a gravity knife as well as six wax envelopes containing a tan powdery substance believed to be heroin.

The subject was subsequently charged with committing three burglaries, four counts of criminal possession of a weapon and criminal possession of a controlled substance.

SIXTH PRECINCT TOP COPS APRIL 2015

On April 3, 2015 Police Officers Daniel Hedgecock and Carson Calvo in RMP 619 along with other Sixth Precinct units, responded to an assignment for a panic alarm at a T-Mobile store in Flower Hill. This location had been the subject of prior Robberies and Burglaries. Upon arrival there were no persons visible in the showroom of the store and the Officers began to search the building. As the Officers attempted to enter a backroom the door was quickly pulled

closed from within. The Officers who were already on high alert because of the history of crimes at the location and the lack of people during business hours made a second attempt at the door this time opening the door wide enough to observe a male subject before it was forced closed again. The Officers took cover and could hear the slamming of a door from within the backroom. Believing that the subjects exited the building the Officers also exited the building and ran towards the rear entrance. Two armed subjects were observed fleeing on foot from the rear of the building and were pursued by the Officers. The subjects split up and ran through residential yards and businesses. Police Officer Sal Parisi and Police Officer Rob Germani arrived at scene and joined Officers Hedgecock and Calvo in the search and pursuit of the subjects. Officers Germani and Parisi apprehended one of the subjects and a show up was conducted with positive results. A perimeter was set up and the search for the second subject was continued by Officers Hedgecock and Calvo. Proceeds of the Robbery along with a weapon used and subjects' clothing were recovered. A K9 unit was also brought in to search the area with negative results. Because of their quick response and actions on that day involving the arrest of a subject for a Robbery in progress, Police Officers Hedgecock, Calvo, Parisi and Germani are our Top Cops for April 2015.

TOP COPS

The Top Cop Committee would like to congratulate PO Dave Olsen and Sgt. Craig Berge on the honor for May 2015.

On May 2nd, Officers responded to a radio assignment for a robbery that just occurred in Hicksville, involving a knife. PO Olsen responded to the location at Malone Street/East Avenue in Hicksville. Officer Olsen did not see anyone at the location and started to do a canvass of the area with the information that was read out over the air. Officer Olsen was advised that the complainant was on a nearby street by an elementary school. Olsen responded to the location and was met by several witnesses. The witnesses explained the situation of where the victim had his bicycle taken from him. The witnesses helped retrieve the bicycle and the victim and the victim was responding to his residence. Witnesses gave a direction of travel of the subjects who had taken the bicycle. They were two males last seen walking on Blueberry Lane. PO Olsen and Sgt. Berge, hearing the call over the radio and trying to assist, quickly descended on the aforementioned street and the vicinity of. A thorough canvass was then initiated. Olsen spotted the subjects and was able to apprehend them with the assistance of Berge. Both of the subjects were evasive as to where they were coming from and what they were doing. Due to the nature of the robbery, for officer safety, PO Olsen proceeded to frisk the subjects for any weapons that could possibly harm the officers. Sgt. Berge asked the subjects if they had any weapons on them. One subject responded, "Yeah I have a knife in my left pocket." Berge safely secured the knife and transported the weapon to the reporting officer. While this was taking place, the victim rode up on his bicycle and stated, "That is them, they beat me up and took my bike."

The result: These two crooks were placed under arrest and transported to the 2nd Precinct for arrest processing. An investigation revealed that the victim and the subjects had an argument. It escalated to where they pushed and punched the victim and took his bike. Victim repeatedly tried to recover the bike as they peddled away. Another altercation erupted where one subject pulled out a pocket

knife, opened the blade, and thrust it at the victim. Witnesses came to the victim's aid. This time, the subjects fled after the bike was retrieved by the witnesses. Due to their quick action's, thorough search, and due diligence on the interviews with witnesses at the scene, these armed subjects were apprehended and charged with Robbery 1st. This also could have prevented further crimes.

Joe Sal's Take: Sgt Berge is one of the most well liked supervisors in our precinct. Dave Olsen is a quiet, yet unassuming professional whose talents are being sought after by the aviation bureau as well as other units. These two fine cops are some of the finest this County has.

-The Top Cop Committee would like to honor the triumvirate of PO Jimmy Dolgos, PO Nick Rooney, and Sgt. Jeff Raymond on the honor for June 2015.

On June 11th, 2015, a radio assignment went out for a customer at a bank in Levittown trying to cash a fraudulent check. The teller stated the individual approached her and wanted to cash a check. Sensing the check was a fake, the teller brought the check to her manager. While they were looking over the check and the subject's identification, the subject kept approaching the two of them, asking what the delay was in cashing the check. At this point, the subject asked for his ID back. There was another male in the bank, and the both of them both exited the bank together before jumping into a silver auto and proceeded to drive through the parking lot. PO Dolgos, a seasoned veteran, was responding to the bank where the bank manager informed him upon arrival where the auto in question was located. Dolgos proceeded through the parking lot where he spotted an auto matching the description given to him. PO Dolgos quickly pulled up next to the driver door of the vehicle so that the driver could not exit. Dolgos then got out of his RMP and demanded to see the subject's hands. Officer Rooney, one of the most talented of the new crop, was responding down Hempstead Turnpike and saw what was transpiring. Intuitively, he blocked the front of the subject's vehicle with his RMP. The driver in the subject's car suddenly put the auto in reverse and sped through the parking lot. PO Dolgos got back into his car and as he and Rooney followed the subjects who fled out of the parking lot eastbound on Hempstead Turnpike. Weaving in and out of traffic on Route 24, Sgt. Jeff Raymond attentively heard the radio transmissions over the air. Sgt Raymond quickly stopped traffic on Hicksville Road, boxing in the subject's vehicle. Officers Dolgos and Rooney removed the occupants of the vehicle and detained them. Two officers went back to the bank to speak with the victim and witnesses. PO Dolgos then brought a witness to the scene of where the subjects were being detained. The witness positively identified the individuals that were in the bank. Another witness was also brought with same results.

The result: Four subjects were taken to the 2nd Precinct for investigation. Due to the quick response, knowledge of details from communication bureau and witnesses at the bank, two arrestees face charges of Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument.

Joe Sal's Take: These criminals picked the wrong precinct and wrong day to try and commit this white collar crime. Officer Jimmy Dolgos knows the Levittown-Bethpage area like the back of his hand. He is a highly active cop who guys like PO Rooney look up to. It also helps a ton when the patrol supervisor in your sector is Sgt Raymond. Sgt Raymond's services are sought after county wide. Victim pointed out to PO Gozaloff that it was indeed the subject. Gozaloff, from the positive description from the victim, was able to swiftly apprehend the subject and place the subject under arrest.

The result: The arrested subject was charged with Burglary 2nd and Possession of Burglary tools. Property was later able to be returned to its owner and possible future burglaries may have been halted due to PO Gozaloff's efforts.

DEAR JOE SAL

Dear Joe Sal,

Whats up? Hope all is well. I recently received a letter from our beloved credit union informing me that all the funds in my checking account and savings account will be turned over to the NY State Comptrollers Office of unclaimed funds because there has been no activity on my account for 3 years, (it's as if I treated my savings account as a savings account?) So, if that's the rule, great, I can live with that, but the problem I have comes in the 2nd paragraph of the letter they sent me, it says and I quote " please be advised that there will be no follow up letter reminding you to reactivate your account". So what if this letter was lost in the mail? Delivered to the wrong house or tossed out with junk mail? Well according to the letter from Vincent P. Messina CEO of NCPD credit union, your money is gone!!! This is not right!!!! These letters must be sent certified mail!!! Luckily I got my threatening letter, they are giving me until Oct. 30th to "reactivate my accounts "or my funds will be sent to the NY State Comptroller office on Dec 1st 2015. Good thing I got my letter, but I wonder how many of our members didnt???????????????????? Food for thought, especially for our retired members!

Dear Ray,

Well you made me do my homework on this answer Mr. Ray. So here it is regarding the timeline on seizing and the rules required on informing you, the account holder. I hope this helps...

Generally an account is considered inactive or unclaimed when there is no customer initiated activity or contact for a period of three to five years. The specific period is based on the laws or rules of each state.

Each state has an unclaimed property program. Before sending the account balance to the state, the bank is usually required to try to contact the customer (see below). Some banks publish the names of the account holder in a local newspaper. Some banks send a letter to the last known address of the account holder. The bank will turn over the account balance to the state if there is no contact from the account holder.

-State abandoned property programs require banks to turn over the funds of inactive bank accounts to the state treasurer. This practice may also be referred to as escheating an account. Some states require the bank to notify the account holder before they transfer the funds. The bank may be trying to alert you that your account is inactive and if the account remains inactive, it may be escheated to the state. The letter usually explains the actions that the account holder may take to affirm their account and to prevent the transfer of the balance to the state.

Pope Francis visited the United States, and in particular New York City, at the end of September causing Catholics throughout the region to marvel at the power and joy produced by a Papal visit. Many members of the Diocese of Rockville Centre anxiously awaited the opportunity to receive tickets for one of the Papal events. Focusing his audience talk on the family and prayer, Pope Francis said he knows modern life can be frenetic and that family schedules are "complicated and packed." The most frequent complaint of any Christian, he said, is that he or she does not have enough time to pray

"The regret is sincere," the pope said, "because the human heart seeks prayer, even if one is not aware of it." The way to begin, he said, is to recognize how much God loves you and to love him in return. "A heart filled with affection for God can turn even a thought without words into a prayer. It is good to believe in God with all your heart and it's good to hope that he will help you when you are in difficulty or to feel obliged to thank him," the pope said. "That's all good. But do we love the Lord? Does thinking about God move us, fill us with awe and make us more tender?" Bowing one's head or "blowing a kiss" when one passes a church or a crucifix or an image of Mary are small signs of that love, he said. They are prayers. (Reprinted CNS Aug.26, 2015)

These simple acts, along with participation with others in organizations and religious services, will increase our sense of God's love and presence and the realization that we're not alone dealing with modern life's pressures. The pilgrimage of Pope Francis to the America's was an opportunity to reflect on his teaching and simply think about God and think about the Pope Francis. Say a prayer and remember you're not alone.
