Legal Report

THE HEART BILL EXPLAINED

As I am sure you are all aware, Gov. Hochul signed the amendment to the Heart Bill into law as part of the budget for the State. While we were all understandably disappointed that the same exact bill was vetoed at the end of 2022, the comments at that time indicated that the bill should be included as part of the 2023 State Budget, and true to those comments, after being added to the budget, it was now passed and signed into law with immediate effect. With the law now being signed, it is important to go over the details of the Heart Bill in order to dispel any of the rumors that are circulating regarding what it covers and how it will operate.

For starters, this Heart Bill and its amendments contained two different sections of the Retirement and Social Security Law. Section 363-a is the section that covers members of the NYS Police and Fire Retirement System, and it is directly the section that covers Nassau County Police Officers. This section was amended to indicate that if an officer becomes disabled from duties due to an impairment of the heart, then that disability will be found to be presumptively incurred in the performance and discharge of duties but also found to be the natural and proximate result of an accident. This is the section that changes your heart bill entitlement from a 50% claim to one that pays 75% of final average salary. This is a huge success in coming to equity with your brothers and sisters in other systems that already

enjoy the benefits of a 3/4 Heart Bill.

Of course, there are requirements that go along with this bill, as there are with any others. It should be noted that this bill requires a member to be "presently employed" when they file for the benefit and the disability must start while presently employed. This mimics other heart bills where members must be "in service" when they apply for the disability, so it is not a clause that is without comparison in other systems. Further, it was part of the discussion process towards getting the bill passed and ultimately signed. The Retirement Systems did not want to leave open a presumption that could be utilized by members retired for many years or who develop their heart conditions years after retiring from the job. As such, it is designed to protect the active members who incur heart conditions while working, presumptively as a result of the rigors and stresses of the job, and who ultimately cannot continue to work as police officers due to the condition.

The second thing that needs to be stressed is that the bill does still require an actual "disability" from work. Thus, if a member has a heart condition, but that heart condition is fixable or treatable either through surgery or medications, then that member is not permanently disabled despite having the heart condition. This is exactly the same as any other impairment such as a back injury. It should go without saying that if your medical condition or injury can be repaired or treated in order to continue your career, then the Retirement System and case law requires that a member entertain any reasonably safe and prudent treatment to correct the disability.

The third major aspect to this disability bill is that the presumption is rebuttable. What that means is that a member is presumed to have contracted their heart impairment as a result of the work activities, but the burden shifts to the Retirement System to disprove that causal link, if it so chooses. Thus, although the burden is always on the applicant to prove that he or she is disabled from duties, the member does not have to prove that work caused the heart disease or heart impairment. This is similar to the 9/11 Presumption where members do not have to prove that their 9/11 condition was caused by their exposure. They are given that fact. However, much like the 9/11 presumption, the Retirement System can counter the presumption only with competent and reasonable evidence to the contrary. In this situation it could be things such as family history of heart disease independent of police work or a condition that is generally congenital or genetic as opposed to stress induced. This situation should be addressed on a case by case basis, but it is no different than any other Retirement System which also has the ability to rebut the Heart Bill presumption, if they so choose. Until claims are filed, we do not know

how hard the NYS Police and Fire Retirement System will challenge these cases or if they will be able to rebut the presumption. In cases where there is no family history or no other known etiology or cause for the heart impairment, there should be no reasonable way for the Retirement System to rebut the presumption.

It should be noted that the Retirement System and Comptroller's office did an assessment of the bill before it was passed and signed, as it does with every bill regarding the Retirement System and benefits. In this instance, the bill clearly highlights three major advantages to members: 1) the member does not actually have to have a heart related accident on the job; 2) the member's disability is not related any specific accident on the job; and 3) the member failed to provide notice of the disability. In addition, not only does the disability pension increase from 50% to 75%, but the death benefit tied to a heart related death will now increase from the continuance of the performance of duty benefits at 50%, and it instead is now a Special Accidental Death Benefit of 100% of final average salary minus applicable Workers' Compensation and Social Security benefits. This is another huge addition that the bill provides.

The second statute and section of the law that the bill created is Section 809 of the Retirement and Social Security Law. This section is equally as important for our officers, but it is even more important for other members of the Retirement System that are affected and covered under their own Heart Bills. This would include members such as court officers who already had a 3/4 Heart Bill, but it was functionally nonexistent because of the current case law on the issue. This section of the law completely fixes the errors made by the Appellate Division, Third Department, in its perversion of the case law on heart impairments. In one of the seminal cases on a heart bill related issue, the Third Department ruled in 2010 that, although a heart related presumption existed and read that the condition was presumptively the result of an accident on the job, the law also required that the heart related disability had to be caused by and the result of an accident incurred on the job. That could not have been a more twisted way of eliminating the heart related presumption. Thus, the importance of Section 809 is that it codifies into law that for heart bills under the RSSL, heart related disabilities shall be presumptively incurred in the performance of a member's duties and as a result of an accident under the law with the added notations that an application for benefits SHALL NOT BE REQUIRED to show that the member sustained an accident or other incident related to the performance of duty or that notice of any accident was provided as part of the disability. In short, this section gave back the presumption to members throughout the state that had lost the effectiveness of their presumption through case law.

As for the rebuttable presumption, this is an aspect of the law that has existed since the bills inception, and it is clearly language that exists in other agencies heart bills as well. General Municipal Law 207-k covering police and fire in the NYC systems also contain the clause at the end of the statute "shall be presumptive evidence that it was incurred in the performance and discharge of duty, unless the contrary be proved by competent evidence." How that presumption is fought by the Retirement System is up for debate, and each System may handle their cases differently. Thus, some agencies may be more liberal in awarding the benefit than others, but we do not know how the NYS Police and Fire Retirement System will challenge these cases, or which and if they will challenge these cases, until the claims are filed and litigated. In the meantime, this is a major shift in the landscape for heart impairments in our favor! The Retirement System is already attributing increased costs to the system based on the new heart bill which means it believes that many more 3/4 claims will be awarded based on the approval of this bill.

Ultimately, each case must be assessed on a case by case basis. I have already received a ton of phone calls since the passage of the bill. Many of those questions are answered in this commentary on the bill. One of the main ones that hasn't been addressed yet is which heart conditions are covered and can I win with what I have? Once again, that depends.

For as long as heart bills have existed, not every heart condition has been covered under the bills despite the language seeming to suggest otherwise. This falls in line with the idea that the presumption is rebuttable by the System. The heart bills have been historically designed to protect members who come onto the job and pass a physical examination with no otherwise disabling heart condition, but while they are working develop a heart condition that ultimately disables them from work. The conditions they endeavored to cover are those that the general medical community believes are caused or aggravated by the incredible stresses associated with law enforcement and firefighting work. Therefore, the conditions that are generally attributable to genetics or congenital defects or cannot competently caused by stress will not be covered and have never been covered under these presumption style bills. Thus, if a member has a doctor that believes they have a condition that should or could be covered, we will send that doctor a copy of the typical heart bill related conditions for the doctor to comment on the applicability of the patient's condition to those conditions. If the doctor can make an argument why it is a valid heart bill condition then fighting for that disability to be covered will be our utmost goal.

In general, the types of conditions that are covered consist of Coronary Artery Disease, disabilities due

to Hypertensive Heart Disease, and any Myocardial Infarctions (heart attacks) whether directly caused by work activities or not. There are other conditions that can be covered in the presence of hypertension or coronary stenosis as well, but they are assessed on a case by case basis much as an orthopedic impairment would.

Overall, in our opinion, this is a huge achievement for the members of the Police and Fire Retirement System across the entire state. Members of both the Police and Fire System as well as the Employees' Retirement System will benefit from the improvements and amendments made to the heart bills statewide. We do not know how the Retirement System will react to these claims or whether they will be capable of rebutting the presumption successfully, but the bill by itself increases the potential benefits for police officers and their families in the unfortunate instance that they become disabled or worse due to a heart impairment. A massive amount of kudos is due to the hardworking members that have lobbied upstate for years on this undertaking for the betterment of their brothers and sisters in the System. As always, it is an honor and privilege to represent the men and women of the NCPBA, and especially when they lead the way on issues affecting police officers throughout the state.

Another congratulations to PO Tarlecki and his wife on the birth of their beautiful baby girl Zoey! Both mom and baby are doing well.

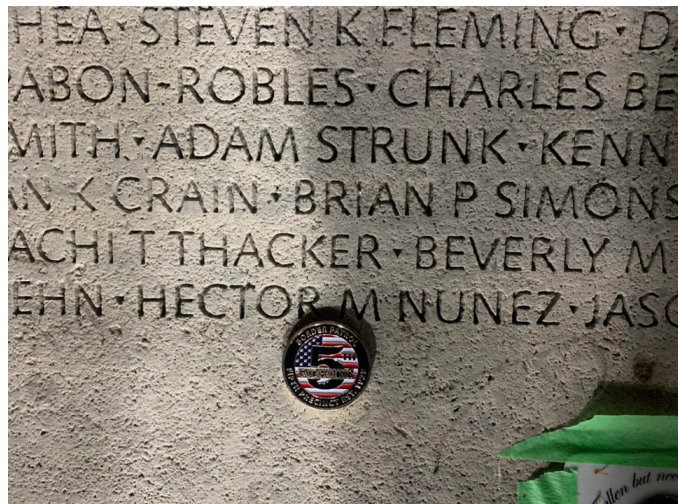

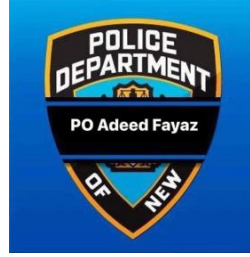
