Legal Report

Occasionally, there is some good news to report regarding the Retirement System. Over the past year, we have had some great decisions go our way as opposed to years past where the Retirement System was consistently watering down disability benefits. While most cases still do not result in Accidental Disability benefits for members, there is a great deal that can be learned from each decision. Those decisions create more and more precedent that can only help reinforce the strategies that we have implored members to follow for years or educate us for how to react to situations going forward.

One major case that came down within the last two years was a case where we represented a court officer who was denied by the Retirement System at each level on the basis that although she was found to be permanently disabled from the full duties of her job title, her disability was not the result of an "accident" as the term is defined by the Retirement System. In this case, the member had slipped on a freshly mopped, lightly tiled floor causing her to suffer multiple injuries. At both the application level and hearing level, the Retirement System took the position that the member was merely performing routine duties while injured, but the Appellate Division agreed with our position that the underlying cause to the injury could not have been anticipated by the applicant. This position has now become the basic standard for "accidents" under the disability pension law.

This standard has been further pressed in the recent decisions that we have seen made by the Retirement System itself. We recently had an approval for 3/4 Accidental. Benefits for a member who became injured while responding to a scene where a paver stone in a driveway became dislodged causing the member's injury. The obvious key to the scenario is that before the member completed his or her accident statement for the Department, the member contacted our office to assist

in the drafting of the statement. The key fact was that the member could not anticipate the stone becoming dislodged which made the event accidental. If it were simply drawn up as responding to the scene and suffering a "slip and fall" or "trip and fall", the member would have been denied for 3/4 benefits.

The biggest takeaway from these cases on "accidents" is that the initial accident statement and the factors involved matter more than any subsequent testimony in the matter. The Retirement System takes the position that anything that occurs after that initial statement really becomes a re-writing of the history of the case. Therefore, we constantly implore members to take full advantage of the resources in front of them regarding their accident reports. Please focus on the unanticipated aspects of the events in question because those little factors might make the difference between 3/4 and 50% disability pensions.

Interestingly, we have seen the Retirement System approve some other cases or take strange positions as well. While the overwhelming number of cases will take between 14 to 18 months because the Retirement System is painfully slow, we have actually had cases approved in 7 months and 9 months recently. Also, we had a case that the Retirement System denied at both the application and hearing levels, but when we brought the case up to the Appellate Division on an Article 78 appeal, the Attorney General's office actually refused to defend the case. Instead, their office agreed with our position and sent the case back to the Retirement System for approval.

On a sour note, the Appellate Division recently denied an officer for even Performance of Duty Disability Retirement benefits on the basis that the officer was performing purely personal activities as opposed to "police duties" while at work. In that case, an officer was overly honest and indicated that she slipped and injured herself while getting coffee at the local convenience store while out on patrol. This was what was written in the accident history, and while this is perfectly acceptable inside the context of Workers' Compensation, the Retirement System took the position that this was a purely personal endeavor and not covered. The Appellate Division affirmed this decision which now leads to the unenviable position of having to address these personal activities as part of accident claims. The court even had a footnote that said the question of accidents occurring while an officer was going to the bathroom might be a "personal act" but was not a question that the court was looking to answer at this time.

This is even more of a reason to make sure that your accident statements are reviewed before being submitted to the Department. At the very least, any injury should

be discussed with your PBA delegates and trustees to make sure there are no unforeseeable consequences to the event in question. While the vast majority of issues will not be problematic and covered by the Department under 207-c and Workers' Compensation, it is obvious that the Retirement System is taking a much more scrutinizing look at these claims, and they are not giving officers the benefit of the doubt. Quite honestly, this is not a case that our office would have brought up to the Appellate Department on appeal, but a decision such as this now affects all officers statewide.

Overall, these cases are still incredibly difficult, but the vast majority of the cases that will win disability benefits will only do so because of the development that is done on the cases at the earliest levels. This starts in the instant following an injury and that initial accident statement. Of course, our office is always available for members when they have questions about how to draft their statements and then how to develop their cases in Workers' Compensation as well as for the Retirement System.

ATTA BOY

June Top Cop - Steven Tria and Harold Warren

On June 20, 2023 PO Tria and Warren were on routine Patrol responding to a radio call for a shot spotter activation. As the Officers were traveling to the scene of the shots that were fired, they noticed two males running toward a gray Nissan. After watching the subject enter the vehicle and decided to follow it as it headed north and then onto the Southern State Parkway westbound. The Officers that responded at the scene of the shots did find shell casing at the location. As the vehicle exited the Southern State the Officers initiated a felony traffic stop. All occupants were removed from the vehicle and the vehicle was searched. A fanny pack was found in the back seat with .45 caliber handgun which matched the shell casings located at the scene.

July Top Cop – Frank Camidge and Steven Delaney One July 22, 2023 PO Camidge and Delaney observed a vehicle operating with no front headlight, a rear plate lamp out and obstructed rearview mirror. Officers activated their emergency lights and proceed to conduct a VTL stop. While the defendant was retrieving paperwork the Officers observed the butt of a handgun protruding from underneath the driver's side chair. Officers removed the defendant and retrieved a 9mm caliber polymer 80 ghost gun containing multiple rounds of ammunition within a 33 -round magazine. The defendant was taken into custody. The defendant was found to have had outstanding Arrest Warrant for Murder 2nd and Conspiracy 1st, and Conspiracy 2nd.

August Top Cop-Tristan Alfano and Brendan Sloan

On August 15, 2023 - PO Alfano and Sloan were dispatched to a 911 call for gun shots on Jerusalem Avenue in No Bellmore. The Defendant at the location was in possession of a loaded firearm. The defendant acted with no care to human life was recklessly, fired the weapon at a busy intersection filled with motorist and pedestrian civilians. This created grave risk of death for all individuals at this location. The Officers used the corner of their RMP to take down the defendant and then taken into custody. The firearm recovered was a Jennings J-22LR semi-automatic.

This incident sparked the residence in the area and civilians that saw the footage to email the Commissioner and the First Precinct email system with such Gratitude and Praising the Officers.

September Top Cop-Jack Bonner and Philip Buonora

On September 23, 2023 PO Bonner and Buonora were dispatched to an auto accident in Baldwin. Upon arrival at the scene the Officers discovered a vehicle that had crashed into a utility pole with a female victim entrapped in the front passenger seat. The victim was pinned between the center console and the passenger's side door which had been crushed towards the center of the vehicle after colliding with the utility pole. Officers put over a quick notification and asked ESU to cut the victim out of the vehicle. Their quick response to the situation were able to save the victim pinned inside the vehicle Upon further investigation the Officers discovered the driver of the vehicle who excited the car after the crash. The defendant was heavily intoxicated and place under arrest for DWI

HISTORY

MAY DAY

On Sunday, August 13, 2023 at approximately 1610 hours, the crew of Marine 11 overheard a "May Day" call over VHF 16 for a 38' vessel in distress south of Hart Island in the Long Island Sound. The vessel had an active fire in the engine compartment and was requesting immediate assistance. Having been on patrol in the area, POs Lemke and Castka quickly arrived on scene, observed the vessel and advised the 3 POBs to immediately don life jackets. The 3 occupants were then taken aboard Marine 11.

Within minutes, PO's Stassi, Carlson, Gervasio and Lt. Grella aboard Marine 9 arrived to assist and the fire condition was addressed with the crew shutting down the motors and electrical system. Marine 9 then proceeded to take the vessel in tow back to safe harbor with Marine 11 transporting the vessel operator and passengers. This assignment is a great example of teamwork, post knowledge and efficient response time. Well done, boys!



MARINE 5 TO THE RESCUE

On Sunday, September 17, 2023 at approximately 0445 hours, the crews of Marine 1 and Marine 5 received a Distress Response assignment for a person in the water in the vicinity of the Wantagh Parkway #3 bridge. A 30-year-old fisherman had fallen off the Green Island Fishing Pier and had been swept away by the strong new moon currents. While en route, crews were advised that the man's friend had jumped in after him in an effort to save him and he too had fallen victim to the very strong currents.

Conducting patrol operations in the area, POs Killeen, Russo, Chiari, Lemke and Clarke quickly arrived on scene and immediately conducted a search. Knowledge of the direction of the current was paramount and led both crews to commence search operations in the appropriate location in relation to the bridge. Within minutes, crews were able to locate both the victim, who was floating but unconscious, and his friend who tried to save him. Both men were taken aboard the patrol vessels where crews immediately started CPR on the unresponsive male. The victim was quickly transported to a waiting ambulance and then transported to an area hospital for advanced medical attention. The male was listed in critical condition but was alive due to the efforts of the responding officers. The second male survived without sustaining any injuries. This assignment is a perfect example of effective teamwork, situational awareness and quick action. Great job, boys! Nicely done.

NCPD HISTORY DID YOU KNOW

PATROLMAN JOHN KENNEDY SHOT IN 1928

When reading keep in mind that Nassau County Police started on April 16, 1925 and the first Detectives were appointed in June 24, 1925. So, ALL the Detectives working this case only had about 3 years experience in Law Enforcement and 2½ years experience as Detectives. They had no one other than themselves who had minimal experience to bounce this case off of. Read to the end and find some historical facts of the Nassau County Police Department.

Patrolman John D. Kennedy Shield 133, Nassau County Police Department

On July 27, 1928, a 24-year-old patrolman with two years on the Nassau County Police Department named John D. Kennedy was working a midnight shift in the First Precinct. He was on patrol in his Chevrolet Roadster. The night air was warm, and a heavy mist hung over the land, the threat of rain quite evident. PTL. Kennedy had been instructed when he came on duty to check a "lover's lane" area called Water works Lane in Woodmere (presently located within the Fourth Precinct which was not formed until December 3, 1928). In recent weeks there have been numerous reports of roving thugs committing assaults and stickups of people using the quiet heavily wooded area as a lover's lane. Patrolman normally would not tour the Water Works property unless specifically ordered to do so because it was private property. As Kennedy powered the roadster through the Water Works his headlights divulged the presence of another vehicle backed into the bushes. As he got closer, he did not see anyone in the auto. As he negotiated the terrain, the front

bumper of the police car became hung up on a hidden tree stump. Unable to maneuver the police car free he got out to investigate the parked auto. As he approached it a voice called out who's there"? Kennedy quickly replied, "A policeman". Without another word a single shot rang out piercing the silence of the night. The bullet ripped through Kennedy's chest entering just below his shield. Patrolman Kennedy fell to the ground and believing he was seriously wounded he struggled to keep conscious hoping to get a look at his assailants. A silhouette rushed past him, and the doors of the auto slammed shut. As the car sped off Kennedy avoided instant death by pulling his head and arm out of the path of the gunman's fleeing car. The fleeing car's wheels spun the mud, splattering Kennedy's uniform with mud. The car passed him so closely as it left that Kennedy's coat sleeve was creased by a tire impression. Instinctively Kennedy sought to get a glimpse of the license plate number and after doing so he found a piece of paper inside his hat and scrawled the number "8L685".

At about this same time, Mrs. Robert Rousse called the precinct and notified Sergeant John Baumann, on duty, that she had heard shots coming from the vicinity of the Water Works. Sergeant Baumann, in turn, notified Patrolman Frederick S. Hirsch Jr. of this call and instructed him to respond to the area to investigate. Being assigned to foot patrol, Patrolman Hirsch quickly flagged down a passing motorist and engaged the assistance of Mr. Fred Kopter, a Hewlett Centre merchant to drive him to the location, thus Patrolman Hirsch becoming the first officer to reach the stricken Kennedy.

As they approached the wooded Lane Patrolman Hirsch suddenly yelled "stop". Hirsch could see in his path the figure of a fellow comrade. As Hirsch got closer to the figure he exclaimed, "it's Jack Kennedy". Hirsch could see a widening dark stain forming on Kennedy's coat, beneath his shield. Hirsch inquired as to any details of the shooting Kennedy might have. Kennedy weakly answered, "It was a New York plate 8L865." Officer Kennedy was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in Far Rockaway. It was not long before doctors notified Police Officials that Kennedy would not live. The .38 caliber bullet had torn its way through his abdomen and lodged itself in the spinal cord.

Meanwhile back at the scene of the shooting, Captain Earl Comstock and Detective Lieutenant Emil Morse had arrived to begin the investigation. Patrolman Hirsch immediately reported to Lieutenant Morse the plate number that Kennedy had told him "8L865". A search of registration files showed that the owner of a car with that plate number lived in Woodmere. After the owner was questioned by the police he said that his wife had the car on vacation in Spofford Lake, New Hampshire. Captain Harold King was already in New England on other police business. When informed of the circumstances he personally found the car at Spofford Lake and determined that it would have been impossible for it to have been involved with the shooting of Patrolman Kennedy.

At his bedside Kennedy was told of the results of the investigation of the plate number personally by Chief Skidmore. Patrolman Kennedy told the Chief "Look in my hat, I wrote the number down on a piece of paper." Lieutenant Morse searched Kennedy's uniform and found several slips of paper in the cap lining. One of them, in Kennedy's scribbled writing read "8L685". Somehow in talking to Patrolman Hirsch the 6 and 8 had become inverted. Kennedy further told them he was positive the gunman had escaped in a maroon Willy-Knight sedan because he could clearly make out the auto maker's emblem. This plate number was checked, and it was found that the auto bearing had been impounded in Buffalo, New York by the federal government because it had been used by bootleggers attempting to smuggle liquor into the country a year earlier. It was found still secured in a locked impound yard. Another solid lead had ended at a stone wall.

A heavy all-night rain had given way to a clearing dawn. As the sunlight seeped through the last of the overcast skies, searchers at the crime scene got a break. Captain Comstock and Patrolman Michael Delany spotted a grey fedora hat. It lay about six feet from where the gunman's car had been parked. Close inspection of the hat showed that the initials "A.B." had been printed in the lining.

Armed with only two small bits of evidence, the initials "A.B." and the owner of a Willy-Knight sedan, detectives began the largest investigation in the department's short history. Telephone directories were scoured and possible "A.B." names were pulled. Over 100,000 motor vehicle registration cards were checked by hand. Innumerable combinations of plate number 8L685 were checked without results. The case was given as much newspaper publicity as could be had. This publicity finally paid off when an anonymous caller led police to a young couple who had been the victims of a robbery netting \$1.50 by two men armed with a gun at the lover's lane, shortly before Patrolman Kennedy had arrived. After taking the money the robber had ordered them to leave, which they did.

With no new leads the investigation waned, and weeks suddenly had become years. Patrolman Kennedy had wasted away from 200 lbs. to 124 lbs. He suffered constantly from unbearable pain and pleaded to be allowed to take his own life. Finally, on July 13, 1932, just ten days short of four years after his ambush, Patrolman Kennedy succumbed to his wound. On July 16 he was accorded an Inspector's funeral the sight of which gave a new incentive to investigators to press on in the search for Kennedy's killer. His case was the top priority for the entire department. Kennedy's blood-stained overcoat at headquarters was a constant reminder that investigators could not rest until their job was complete.

On November28,1933, came a phone call bringing with it the break they had hoped for more than four long years after the shooting. Detective James P. McKeough of the 105th Squad, New York City Police Department told Inspector King that he had three men in custody and that one had claimed "I know a guy who knows a guy who killed a cop." In less than an hour Nassau Detectives were interviewing the youths who later led them to a ramshackle house in the rear of 22 Zavatt Street Inwood. After breaking down the door police confronted a startled man named William French. French was extremely nervous while being questioned and insisted he didn't know anything about any murdered cop. French was taken back to Nassau Police Headquarters for further questioning. He suddenly changed his story and was relieved to get the whole affair off his mind.

"What's the name of the guy who killed the patrolman?" Captain King asked.

French replied, "Al Brengard killed the cop"

Finally, a name had emerged fitting the initials "A.B." French continued, "Brengard lived on Waldingen Street, Valley Stream. He owned a maroon Willys-Knight car. He carried a gun and kept it under the cowling, on top of the ignition wires. Brengard had lost a gray fedora the night of the shooting." French also revealed that Al Brengard was presently serving time in Trenton, New Jersey for another shooting.

The case had suddenly seemed about ready to end. Detectives pulled out the gray fedora hat while routinely going over the evidence they had accumulated. To their instant horror they discovered that the lining which had bore the initials "A.B." was missing from the hat. This made their hat just one of possibly many thousands manufactured at the same time and was worthless as hard incriminating evidence. It was learned that the fedora had been turned over to a special investigator named John Fogarty. Fogarty was to have had the lining photographed and mothproofed to preserve it as evidence. Shortly after receiving the fedora for processing, Detective Fogarty was hired as an investigator by Colonel Charles Lindbergh during the case involving the kidnapping of Lindbergh's infant son. Before Fogarty was able to tell anyone what he had done with the lining of the fedora, he suffered a fatal heart attack.

Detectives were dispatched to Trenton, New Jersey to interrogate Brengard and gather more facts. They learned that he had been imprisoned for shooting a young girl who he blamed as the reason for losing his job at the Ford Motor Company in Edgewater, New Jersey. Brengard cooly denied having any knowledge of the killing of a Nassau County Policeman. He also denied knowing a man named French.


Through complicated legal maneuvers, Berngard was brought back to Nassau County. Detectives had learned that Berngard was a former New York State Police Trooper and as such would be completely familiar with the handling of a firearm and police techniques concerning interrogation and investigation. Nassau Police also

brought back with them Bernard's gun a .38caliber Smith and Wesson, and the bullet that had been removed from the young girl's arm. These items, along with the bullet that had been removed from Patrolman Kennedy's spine were sent to Sergeant Harry Butts of the New York City Police Ballistics Bureau. Butts concluded that the bullet that had taken the life of Patrolman Kennedy had been fired from Berngard's .38

Detectives concentrated on questioning French. Their efforts paid off when French finally admitted he had been with Berngard on the night of the shooting and had watched him pull the trigger. After several of Berngard's alibies were disproved he finally admitted to owning a maroon willy-Knight car, its registration plate – 9L6865 and that the last time he had seen it was when it was repossessed. The car, or what remained of it, was eventually found in a junk yard in Hicksville, New York. Only the engine serial number remained to point a finger of guilt to its former owner.

The facts were presented to the Grand Jury, and it quickly indicted both Berngard and French for the murder of Patrolman Kennedy.

On January 15, 1934, their trial began in Mineola. It lasted nine days and concluded with the jury Forman's statement, "We find Alphonse Brengard guilty of murder in the first degree." Followed by, "We find William French guilty of murder in the second degree." At sentencing Judge Cortland A. Johnson pronounced life in prison for French and the death penalty for Berngard who angrily looked up at the judge and said, "That's the first time I ever got something for nothing."

The first senseless murder of a

Nassau County Policeman had, at last, been completed. Nassau's Police were finally able to rest a little easier, unfortunately it would not be the last case of its kind they were ever to investigate.

Shortly after midnight on May 6, 1931, Patrolman Fred Hirsch, who you remember was the first officer to reach Patrolman Kennedy after he had been shot, he himself was shot and killed in Merrick New York.

THE CASE OF THE LADY IN THE BARREL

On September 2, 1999, a couple was in the process of purchasing a home in Jericho, N.Y. The new owners requested the seller of the house remove a 55-gallon steel drum from the crawl space of the house. The seller, with the help of the movers, removed the barrel and placed it on the curb. The next day town employees refused to take the drum because they did not know what was in it and because it was very heavy. The seller then popped off the lid and made a gruesome discovery. A human hand and a shoe protruded through the rusted remains of a second drum.

The Homicide Squad was notified, and Det. Sergeant Bob Edwards and Det. Brian Parpan investigated the case. D/Sgt Edwards said we like to put a case away in 72 hours but here is one where it could be as much as two or three decades old. The investigation would take them to New York City, New Jersey and to Florida.

The contents of the drum were taken to the Nassau County Medical Examiner's office in East Meadow where Detective Parpan and other detectives extracted the remains of a woman. She was approximately 4'9" tall, whose weight was now 57 pounds, she had long black hair. At the autopsy it was discovered that the woman was nine months pregnant. An extensive autopsy was conducted, and the cause of death was "blunt force head trauma". The fetus was extracted from the drum. The woman was fully dressed and was wearing several pieces of jewelry. A pocketbook was also found inside the drum which contained an address phone book.

The house was built in 1957 and the original owners lived in the house until 1972 when they sold it. The original owner of the house was also the owner of a plastics business in Manhattan N.Y. His business made plastic flowers for displays in department stores. He had about 80 employees, 20 men and 60 women. The woman in the drum was a petite Hispanic woman with long black hair

with gold front teeth, at the time the detectives believed that the woman in the drum may have been one of those employees.

The drum she was found in had been manufactured as a chemical container, it was manufactured in Linden N.J. in March 1963. The second owner of the house was interviewed and says he bought the house in 1972 and he remembers seeing the drum in the crawl space when his family moved into the home.

Address phone Book

The address book was to be examined by the Scientific Investigation Bureau (SIB) the "Questioned Documents Section". Detective Joan Fiertner of that unit was assigned to go to the morgue and pick up the address book. At first the address book was indecipherable. It had been soaking like a sponge in fluids from decomposed bodies for several decades. For days Detective Fiertner and Detective Sergeant Dennis Ryan, who was the Commanding Officer of the Unit, would don Charcoalfiltered respirators, goggles, rubber gloves and lab coats as a precaution against potential toxins. After a period of restoration of the address book Detective Fiertner and Detective Sergeant Ryan discovered her resident Alien registration number which lead to her identification. Also written in the book was "Don't be mad, I told the Truth." D/Sgt Edwards and Det. Parpan responded to Florida to interview the now 70-year-old former owner of the home. When they got to Florida, they were notified by the Homicide Squad that the young woman had just been identified through her Alien Registration number. She was identified as Reyna Angelica Marroquin, dob 12-4-1941 a Salvadorian Immigrant. She immigrated legally to the United States in August 1966. Further investigation showed that she came to New York and found a job at the plastics company in Manhattan which was owned by the first owner of the house in Jericho. Reyna went missing in 1969, but just prior to her going missing Reyna called her friend and said that she did a terrible thing. She said he had called the wife of her boss, the owner of the plastics company and the owner of the house, she said she told his wife that she was having an affair with her husband, and she was pregnant with his child.

During the interview in Florida, they asked the prior owner of the house to provide a DNA sample, but he refused. They then said that they were going to go to court and get a Court Order from a Judge to take his DNA and they would be back.

The next day the former owner of the house went and purchased a shot gun and 2 boxes of ammunition. He

then went to a neighbor's house which he had been tending, went into the garage and sat in the back seat of his neighbor's car and committed suicide by shooting himself in the head. The DNA taken from the fetus identified the former owner of the house as the father of the baby.

POLICE PILOT SERGEANT ROBERT HARRIS





On May 17, 1978, Police Pilot Sergeant Robert Harris had taken off from Grumman Airport in Bethpage on routine traffic patrol. From various eyewitness accounts, it appeared as though Sgt. Harris may have been looking for a place to land for at least a couple of minutes before the crash. According to the L.I. Newsday a witness stated, "It looked like he knew he was going to crash". The witness was a nine-year-old boy who was playing ball at the Seaman Neck School field with several other boys. One of the boy's mothers said "it (the helicopter) would stall and then come back on. He came down like he was going to land, then veered off." She was referring to Harris" apparent decision not to land at the ball field where the boys were. "He's Quite a hero" said the boy's mother.

Sgt. Harris was able to keep the aircraft airborne long enough to fly away from the boys in the field anticipating that he was going to crash. A crash would have sent shrapnel, broken propeller blades and pieces of the helicopter flying endangering the lives of the boys. As the boy's mother said, "he's quite a hero".

Seargent Harris was appointed to the Nassau County Police Department on December 1, 1949. He served for 29 years. He was a World War II and Korean War Veteran. In the military he received the Air Medal with 3 Oak Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

A Bell-47 helicopter, one of NCPD First Helicopters is on display at the Nassau County Police Department David S. Mack Intelligence and Training Center. The helicopter was located in Minnesota and brought back to Nassau County. It was refurbished and painted back to NCPD blue and orange colors. Inside the bubble is the bottom plate "602" which was on Sgt. Harris' helicopter when he crashed.

AVIANCA FLIGHT 52 JANUARY 25, 1990

On January 25, 1990 at aproximately 2150 hours, Avianca Flight 52 from Bogota, Columbia to JFK Airport, New York, crashed on Tennis Court Rd, a private road in Cove Neck, New York. There were 158 persons on board, 70 fatatiles and 88 survivors. The crash site was a heavily wooded hilly area on the north shore of Long Island. The plane crashed on Tennis Rd which is a private one lane road. The plane came to a stop on a hill with a approximately a 45 degree angel slooping downward. Over 300 police Officers, Supervisors and Detectives from NCPD responded. 34 Volunteer Fire departments were called to responded but many more than that responded. Three Helicopters from NCPD, 4 from NYPD, 1 from Suffolk PD and 1 helicopter from Cornell University Medical Center, Manhattan responded. The Helciopters transported 22 critical aided people. All the aided from the crash were taken to 10 local hospitals.

Tennis Court Rd was a one lane road, the first responding officers drove their vehicles to the scene as did the ambulances and then the Fire Department trucks and the private vehicles of the volunteer firefighters created a large traffic jam, compromising the extraction of the adied persons.

One of the first things to be addressed at the crash site, which was handled by Emergency Services Unit was the "stabilization" of the aircraft to prevent it from sliding down the incline as not to jeopardize the lives of rescuers who had entered the broken fuselage. The rescue workers were succesful in removing 95 % of the occupants, both dead and alive within the first two hours of the crash. A command post was estabished to coordinate the personnel at the scene both police and fire. A second command post was established at the Second Precinct. This command post coordinated the relieving of officers and their transportation to and from the crash site. Over 70 Auxiliary police officers, who were not called, arrived and took over the traffic duties. Detectives were called to safeguard the property and teams of detectives were assigned to local hospitals for the purpose of victim identification. The Homicide Squad working with the Medical Examiner's Office establised a temporary morgue on a neighbors front lawn.

There were two drug mules on board the plane and both of them survived the crash only to be arrested by the Narcotics Squad. A drug mule are couriers for drug dealers in Columbia who ingest quanities of cocaine that they transport in their stomachs. Mules are paid approximately \$1,500.00 plus air fare for each smuggling trip. One of the mules had approximately \$250,000.00 worth the cocaine in his stomach.

On February 7, 1990 NCPD held a critque of the crash. The critque was headed by Commissioner Sam Rozzi who said he was very proud of the rescue efforts but that a critque was needed to improve the problems. There were 100 invited guests, of those in attendence were representatives from NCPD, Nassau County Fire Services, National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB),

the Medical Examiners Office, administrators from local hositals as welll as New York City PD and Suffolk County PD

A NTSB representative said that probably there were too many rescurers, but if the jet had been a 747 rather than a 707 those rescuerers would NOT have been enough help.

He complimented on the rescue efforts, which took over six hours, by saying that "he had never seen such and outstanding job ntionwide".

On the second floor of the David S. Mack Intelligence and Training Center there are additional photographs of the crash site.
